

Bill and Ted Introduction Drama

Props: Packed bags Saucepan

Packed suitcase Bubble maker thingy

Microwave Large envelope labelled "Bill and Ted"

Doughnut boxes Brown parcel with uniforms

Ted: Runs on with a packed bag. At last. Brilliant. We're here.

Bill: Walks on with a very large suitcase. Wipes sweat from his brow. I never thought we'd get here. I'm set to burst.

Ted: I know that's how I feel. If I was anymore excited, I think my eyes would burst out of my head and my nose might shoot up straight through the roof. It's been so long coming. I've been pacing up and down my room waiting for this moment. I've been counting down the days.

Bill: No, Ted, I never thought we'd <u>arrive</u>. I never thought I'd get this bag here. I've counted every <u>step</u> we've taken. It feels like there are rocks in here. I don't understand it. When I packed this bag I only packed a couple of T-Shirts and some trainers. Maybe I'm just not as strong as I used to be.

Ted: Oh forget the suitcase, Bill. You big whinging 'nana. We're <u>here</u>. This is <u>our</u> chance. We can become Super Zero's. *Takes a superhero stance*

Bill: Super Zero?

Ted: Yes. I can become a Super Zero. Flexes muscles. And takes a large saucepan and bubble maker out of his bag. Ever ready to save those in Bubbles. It's Super Ted to save the day with a mighty red stew.

Bill: Shaking his head. Oh Ted. You're a disaster. It's a good job we're here to learn because you have absolutely no idea.

Ted: What! That is nonsense. I've done my homework very carefully. I know everything there is to know about Super Zero's. In fact, I'm not sure I have anything to learn. I might get my certificate today, and start doing it for real.

Bill: Where do I start? This is the Super <u>Hero</u> Academy. We're here for one action packed week to learn how to be Super <u>Heroes</u>. Right now you're already a super <u>Zero</u>. We're here to change that.

Ted: Super H.H.H.Hero. *Posing, blowing bubbles.* Ever ready to save anyone in bubbles.

Bill: And, pointing to bubble maker. Ted starts blowing bubbles. Super heroes very rarely save people in bubbles. Normally they save people in <u>TR.</u>ouble. You see people stuck in bubbles never need help. In fact I imagine it's quite nice. But being stuck in trouble, that's a very different matter. People need saving who are in trouble. Do you see? And what's that?

Ted: Embarrassed. Never mind that. This is Red stew. Mum made it. I asked her for it especially. Super <u>H</u>eroes always use red stew. Like, "There's superman, he'll save the day with a mighty red stew!" So if I'm going to be a super hero I need my own red stew that I can save people with. Looking smug. Call me super clever man. Where's <u>your</u> red stew? Hey? I suppose you want to borrow mine don't you? No red-stew-boy. Ha-ha

Bill: Oh Ted. Super heroes don't save the day with a red stew. They save people with a rescue. Rescue. Ted thinks. He opens his mouth. Thinks. Shuts his mouth.

It's when you do something to get someone out of trouble. A rescue.

Ted puts down his saucepan.

Ted: Pause, then remembers his enthusiasm But we're here. Finally. After all the waiting. It's happened. Super Hero

academy. Can we put on the uniforms? Can we? Can we?

Bill: Strangely, that's a good idea. *Unzips bag and looks very confused.*

Ted: Oh, yes. I had a few extra things to bring and I couldn't get them in my bag, so I just thought...

Bill unpacks 4 large boxes of doughnuts

Ted: You can't have this week's excitement on an empty stomach.

Bill: Are these doughnuts?

Ted: Yes. Nodding repeatedly

Bill: All of these boxes? They're all doughnuts? How many are there?

Ted: Starts counting on his fingers. Two hundred

Bill: Raising his voice. TWO HUNDRED

Ted: Whispers and thirty seven.

Bill: What?

Ted: and thirty seven.

Bill: Suddenly sees something else in his suitcase. Hang on! What's that? Pointing into his suitcase. That's not. It can't be. Not here.

Ted: Um. I just thought it would be ...um... helpful Bill brings out a microwave

Bill: A microwave

Ted: I just think that doughnuts taste much better after 5 seconds in the microwave. And if we're here for a week... and if we've got 237 doughnuts... we might as well have them <u>just</u> right.

Bill: Sometimes I just don't get you at all. You're just completely nuts. Where did Mum find you?

Ted: Oh Bill. Don't you know? *Points to his tummy. Grinning.* I came out of Mummy's tummy. *Giggling. His hands start on his tummy and slowly grow imagining pregnancy, and puffs out his cheeks.*

Bill: I know that Ted! What I mean is sometimes, I just can't believe we're brothers. It's like you're from another planet.

Ted: Grins, looking pleased with himself. Thanks

Bill: Picking up brown parcel, reading label. Super Hero Academy Uniform for Bill and Ted. Please wear at all times. Bill starts to open parcel.

Ted: I hate uniforms. Sees what is inside the parcel Wow! They are just the coolest.

Both put on uniform

Bill: Now we're ready to learn. Picks up envelope reading For Bill and Ted. Assignment One

Ted: Great, the fun starts here.

Bill: Let's get our assignment out.

Opens envelope and reads. Welcome to the Super Hero Academy. Prepare yourselves for the best week of your lives. Ted gets progressively more excited, listening carefully. This week, you will learn how to be a Super Hero. Ted nods. You will learn from the best. You will learn from the one true Super Hero: Jesus.

Ted: Yes! Let's get started.

Bill: Continues to read. You can learn from Jesus in the Bible. Slides Bible out of the envelope. This week we'll be hearing from the part of the Bible written by one of Jesus' friends called Mark. Ted is obviously interested and learning this for the first time. Jesus was alive 2000 years ago. But as you'll see, he is still the only one to learn from, if you want to be a real Super hero. Assignment one: Find out what happened when Jesus first arrived.

Ted: Great, let's onto that.

Bill: Hang on, what's that? Sketch music on.

Ted: Back in a mo.

On runs "The sketch"; a superhero dressed completely in black and a face mask, holding a large marker pen or two. He can clink around the room mysteriously for a while allowing Bill and Ted to introduce him. And starts drawing Day 1 Sketch A

Ted: Who's this? How mysterious! He's got nothing but a pen, and he's drawing

Bill: I know who it is. I've heard people whispering about him. I've never seen him before. Few people have. He's a

man of mystery.

Ted: Bill, who is he?

Bill: He's pause "the Sketch". Whispers He never speaks. He only draws.

Ted: Ooh. Pause. He never draws. He only speaks. Pause Really?

Bill: He's a man of mystery. *Aside* And Ted, it's "He never speaks, he only draws" Who appears when all around there is confusion. He can understand the truth when all others are lost...

Ted: And befuddled. I'm certainly befuddled. I often am. But today I really am. What is he drawing?

Ad lib as Sketch draws out "the time has come", using lines like...

It's an explosion

It's happened all of a sudden

It's huge

What's it say?

"The time has...

..Come"

That's what Jesus said

When he arrived.

Bill: But what had arrived? Ted: What was so special?

Bill: We'll need to keep listening.

"Hero or Villain", Cartoon 2 and Concluding the day

Brief excitement and enthusiasm about the Activities just done. Ted explains which activity he just did, and give an account of it to show how he completely misunderstand the whole point (e.g. He played a game with the wrong rules, so he thinks he always won, or he comes on with paint on his face because he decorated his own face rather than the mask)

"Hero or Villain" music starts very quietly and gradually the volume increases.

Bill: Can you hear that?

Ted hides somewhere, cowering

Ted: I'm scared. That means there's a villain here.

Bill: There's no need to be Ted. If there is a villain here, then we'll find them. Then we'll rid the world of another

power of darkness

Ted: Oh alright.

Bill: How are we going to spot a villain?

Ted: I know, they'll have an evil glint in their eye.

Bill: Really?

Ted: Yes. Find the evil glint in their eye.

Bill and Ted rove through the crowd and eventually settle on a leader who has been prepped to answer the questions. Drag him/her out and put him/her on a chair for an interrogation

Ted: Right. This is where starts is. These questions are fearsome and cunning. If you are a villain, then we'll uncover you, you fiend! Give him the first deadly question Bill.

Bill: Are you a hero or a villain?

Ted: That's got him. He's completely be puzzled.

Leader answers, "I'm a hero because I follow the true hero- Jesus"

Ted: Oh. Right. Next one. Why did you first decide to follow the Hero Jesus?

Bill: I think we've got him. This will reveal the truth.

Leader gives an answer. 2 or 3 simple sentences. This is a testimony for children.

So we want the individual's real answers-just simplified.

Ted: HHmmm. Give him the final question. I don't rate his chances.

Bill: What is the best thing about following Jesus?

Ted leaps around with glee

Leader gives an answer. 2 or 3 simple sentences.

Ted: What do you think Bill?

Bill and Ted whisper and discuss, looking around furtively

Bill: We've got a hero here. Rats.

Sketch music

Bill: What's that?

Enter "the Sketch", who starts to draw Day 1 Cartoon B

Ted: It's the Sketch

Bill: whispers He never speaks
Ted: whispers He only draws

Sketch draws out 2nd Cartoon of the day, probably boat first, then foot of Jesus, then Peter Bill and Ted, Ad lib as using lines like...

What's that?

A row of sausages?

Fingers?

No, it's a boat.

With a lovely checked table cloth. That is nice.

No, it's a fishing net

Oh, on a beach... that's where Jesus turned up.

And there is Jesus walking off

He's done his bit. He turned up, "Said the Time has come. The Kingdom of God is near" then walks off

Who's this?

That's Simon. He's following Jesus.

What about his boat, and net. It's his job!

He's left it all. He wants to follow Jesus.

Why?

Because he is the big thing.

He is what everyone had been waiting for

The ultimate hero has finally arrived.

Now it's going to kick off.

Sketch finishes and leaves

Bill: There's a thing

Ted: Oooh I know. Hmmph.

Bill: So, Ted, day 1 is done. Have you been listening?

Ted: Absolutely, with all my ears.

Bill: Hmm. So what do you think is the really big thing you've learnt?

Ted: Pause, careful thought. I think I have definitely discovered without any doubt, and I think I'd be happy to announce this to the world, that for real perfection, 6 seconds in the microwave is the perfect length for a really

good doughnut. 4 seconds leaves it all a bit tepid. 8 second, means the jam burns your mouth. Very dangerous!

Bill: Ted. You have jam for brains. We did not come all this way for you to study jam temperature. I'm not sure you

should come back tomorrow. You are a complete waste of space. Is that <u>all</u> you've learnt?

Ted: Looks offended. Hang on. I can do this. Give me another go.

Bill: Alright. Think carefully.

Ted: The time has come. Jesus the real hero has finally arrived...

Bill: Yes?

Ted: And, the sensible thing to do is to follow Jesus. Cos he's the Big man! Get in! Looks dead pleased with himself.

Bill: Good. Well done Ted. Got there in the end. Let's come back tomorrow.



Bill and Ted Intro Sketch: Day 2

Ted: It's going to be brilliant!

Bill: Fantastic! Ted: Amazing!

Bill: I don't think I've ever been so excited!

Ted: My brains are bubbling over with excitement! Ted begins to lose himself in a daydream. I don't think I've been

this excited since my Birthday... when Mum gave me the box of assorted doughnuts...

Bill: [Bill continues his explanation] ... I'm excited learning all about super heroes...

Ted: ... I opened it up and there were chocolate doughnuts... sugar doughnuts...

doughnuts with sprinkles... doughnuts with holes in them... doughnuts

with jam in them, there was that one with green goo. What was that? It was so sticky!

Bill: Hearing all about the best hero of all...

Ted: But then there was one, that one with icing... except it didn't taste like icing. Mum said it was mould, but it tasted sort of alright. It made my tummy gurgle, not in a <u>very</u> nice way.

Bill: [Clicking fingers] Oi! Doughnut brains! Have you forgotten why we are here? This week is not about doughnuts! It's about heroes!

Ted: I know. Hero academy. I know. What powers do you think they'll teach us? Wizzily, wazzily mind control-ly Wood tricks.

Bill: Probably not

Ted: Seeing through walls? I hate that. I'm in one room, but I can't tell what's happening in the next one?

Bill: Use windows for that? Or even the door?

Ted: Flying? [Arms out pretends to fly, flapping wildly...]

Bill: Ted... I don't think it's that kind of hero school

Ted: I think it is, I can develop my superhero abilities. I'm half way there already I reckon. I am super- guy!

Bill: Ahem! Super hero abilities? Super-guy? Ted! You've been my brother for pause too many years. If you're a super hero, then you're The Incredible.... Wally, or the Super... Eater

Ted: Well Mr I-wouldn't-know-a-hero-if-he-was-standing-in-front-of-me... I've got hero talent! And to prove it I've made a list!

Bill: A list?

Ted: Yeah! A list of all the things only I can do. A list of all the things that might be super-powers!

Bill: Like what?

Ted: Well... if I put my hand under my armpit and squeeze, it sounds exactly like...

Bill: [Interrupting] Ted! I hardly think that's a super power! What's next?

Ted: Ah! This one is brilliant! I have a super-tongue! If I concentrate really hard, I can touch the end of my nose with it...

[Ted tries concentrating intently, but fails...]

Bill: Ted! You are nowhere close! What else is on your list?



Ted: I can hold my breadth for 5 minutes...[Gasps in an holds it looking pleased]

Bill: That's quite impressive...Wait a minute...[Goes over and holds his nose]

Ted: [Spluttering immediately] That could have been really dangerous? What if I'd sunuffocated

Bill: Next?

Ted: [Beginning to flag/doubt himself...] My little toe is double jointed?...

My left ear is slightly higher than my right?

If I eat enough baked beans and Brussel sprouts...

Bill: Interrupting] Ted. Are any of these proper super powers?!

Ted: Listen Mr Know-it-all MacGoo. You haven't been to super-hero school yet, so you don't know. Maybe they are! Maybe I have got hidden talents!

Bill: I think today we'll find out what real super powers actually are. Then you'll look very silly.

Ted: In a grump. I have got super powers

Bill: Let's face it Ted, if you were a hero, you'd be easy to stop.

Ted: What do you mean? I could save the day if I wanted to!

Bill: But Ted. I know your weakness!

Ted: What weakness? I could save the day right now Bill.

Bill: I know something that would render you completely helpless. One thing that would take away any power you think you have.

Ted; I don't understand

Bill: Doughnuts Ted. Your weakness is... doughnuts

Ted: That' not true Ted. I could still save the day even if there were doughnuts...

Bill: No you couldn't Ted. You couldn't even save yourself!

Ted: I could... Unless maybe it was the perfect doughnut... [Begins to day dream] I'm swimming in it. Yum yum.

Bill: Picture the scene. There's a fire. And it's all down to you Ted. You need to be the hero. You need to put out the fire.

Ted: Easy. Ted to the rescue. Putting out fires is easy for someone as super as me!

Bill: But over here... Over here is a doughnut.

Ted: distracted What?

Bill: Don't forget the fire Ted.

Ted: No but... A doughnut... [Day dreamy again...]

Bill: Remember the fire Ted.

Ted: Mmmm... Must rescue the person from the fire... Must rescue the Doughnut from the fire. Mmmm... Yum yum yum... Doughnuts... [Ted grabs it from Bill and stuffs doughnut into his mouth].

Bill: Ted, <u>you</u> have a weakness.

Ted: mmm...[Ted reluctantly nods as he chomps the doughnut]

Bill: Let's get our assignment out.

Bill: Picks up envelope and reads. Assignment 2: Jesus is now busy showing everyone that he is the real hero. Word has spread and now everyone wants to see him in action. Today you will find out Jesus' greatest super power... pause

Ted: Great! Pause What's that bit at the bottom

Bill: ...and your greatest weakness.

Ted: Oh.

Bill: Can you hear that? Ted: Ooh yes.... Why?

Sketch music, on runs "The sketch"; And starts drawing Day 2 Sketch A

Ted: Ooh, it's "the Sketch".Bill: Whispers He never speaks.Ted: Whispers He only speaks.

Bill: Shakes his head. Whispers. He only draws.

Sketch draws out cartoon, in the order: Men looking up, Man being let down from roof and finally the sign saying "sin" Bill and Ted, ad lib, according to which bit Sketch is drawing, using lines like...

They're fascinated.

What do you think's happening?

What are they looking at?

Fireworks? I love fireworks,

An exploding animal? It's shot into the air, and they're watching it falling down.

Oh! It's the man who couldn't walk

His mates are lowering him down.

He must be desperate to walk.

He knew Jesus could do that.

That's his big problem.

Of course it is.

We all love walking.

Imagine that. No walking. Ever.

But what does this sign say?

"Sin"?

Bill: What's that about?

Ted: opens his mouth to start to speak, then rethinks. No idea.

Bill: We'll need to keep listening.

"Hero or Villain", Cartoon 2 and Concluding the day

Brief excitement and enthusiasm about the Activities just done. Ted explains which activity he just did, and give an account of it to show how he completely misunderstand the whole point (e.g. He played a game with the wrong rules, so he thinks he always won, or he comes on with paint on his face because he decorated his own face rather than the mask)

Bill: Draws

Sketch draws out 2^{nd} Cartoon of the day, in this order...Onlooker, man leaping, "sin" sign falling off, then finish with "l'm totally fixed"

Bill and Ted, Ad lib as using lines like...

There's the bloke looking.

Imagine seeing Jesus in the flesh.

What a thrill.

I wonder what he can see this time.

Oh it's the bloke who couldn't walk.

Except now he can

He's the bloke who can't walk who can now walk. That's funny.

No wonder he's so happy. He can walk and jump and skip and run.

There's his sign again

"Sin"

Yes, that's the <u>real</u> problem.

Even worse than not walking.

It means we can't be friends with God. How sad.

But now it's fallen off

Jesus fixed his greatest problem

What's he saying?

"I'm totally fixed"

I get it. He can walk, but he's most pleased because Jesus has fixed his sin

He's totally fixed. All his problems have gone.

Sketch finishes and leaves

Bill: There's a thing

Ted: Oooh I know. Hmmph.

Bill: So, Ted, day 2 is done. Have you been listening?

Ted: Absolutely, my brain has been completely focused

Bill: Hmm. So what do you think is the really big thing you've learnt?

Ted: Pause, careful thought. If I had to think of the greatest super power anyone could ever have, I would probably

 $have \ to \ say... \ invisibility \ because \ then \ you \ could \ sneak \ up \ to \ people \ and \ bite \ chunks \ of \ doughnuts \ without$

them even knowing, they'd just stand there, thinking, I didn't eat that bit, and then you could...

Bill: Bill is on his hands and knees hammering the floor in frustration

Ted: Looks offended. Sorry Bill. That's not it, is it?

Bill: Oh Ted.

Ted: Right. Come on brain. Power up. You can do this. It's all about the super hero's greatest super power. YES! If I

had to think of the greatest super power anyone could ever have, it would be that Jesus can forgive. He can make the paralysed walk but more importantly, he can forgive me, over everything ever. He <u>must</u> be

God...AND he can fix our weakness...

Bill: Which is?

Ted: ... If I see a doughnut... NO, that's not it. Our greatest weakness is SIN. Because it means I can't be friends with

God. I've gone my own way, making myself the King, instead of God.

Bill: Good. Well done Ted. Got there in the end. Let's come back tomorrow



Bill and Ted Intro Sketch: Day 3

Props: Towel Pants Makeshift mask

Ted With outstretched arm leaps around the stage singing the Superman theme to himself. He's wearing pants on the outside of his trousers, and a comfort blanket/towel as a cape. A make-shift mask finishes off a very unconvincing superhero costume.

Bill: Ted! Ignored... Ted!!!... Ignored... TED – Just exactly what are you doing?

Ted: Ted puffs chest out and adopts a deep "super hero" voice. I'm sorry young man, I don't know anyone called "Ted"

Bill: Ted. You can't call me young man when I'm your older brother. What are you doing wearing...?

Ted: Well, young man who I do not know at all. I am in my hero suit.

Bill: That? Ted, don't you know everyone can see your pants?

Ted: I'm afraid you've got me confused with someone else. Although, your "Ted" sounds rather excellent (as well as rather handsome and intelligent)... I am a super hero!

Bill: Ted, I know that it's you! I recognise the underpants... They've still got your name sown in the back! And that towel you're wearing is the comfort blanket you use when you get afraid of the dark.

Ted: Ted snuggles his cape happily. It's possible my cape also keeps me warm and snugly at night. That doesn't stop me being a super hero.

Bill: Yeah? Then what are you called? What is your super-hero identity?

Ted: I'm Super...mumbles

Bill: What was that?

Ted: I'm Super...Looks confused/thoughtful

Bill: Yes?

Ted: Super... Ted? Sounding unconvinced himself Now stroppy he drops the superhero voice.

Oh it's no good Bill! I've been thinking about it all night, & I still can't think of proper name!

Bill: How about "Pants-outside-your-trousers-boy"?

Ted: I'm serious Bill. If I'm going to be a super-hero, I need a proper name.

Bill: You mean a super-hero identity?

Ted: What?

Bill: You know... A super-hero identity. All heroes have a normal identity, and a super-hero identity. Peter Parker's superhero identity is <u>Spider</u>man... Bruce Wayne's superhero identity is <u>Bat</u>man...

Ted: That's brilliant Bill! All I need to do is think of an animal, and then add "man" on the end of it... The animal will give me a name and super-powers all in one! Brilliant!

Bill: Now all we have to do is think of an animal...

Ted: How about... Jelly-fish-man *Wibbly-wobbly sound*. I could be a man entirely man of jelly... *Bill looks unimpressed*

No? How about a stick insect-man?!!! I could stand really still for hours without moving...



Heroes Academy Day 3 Bill and Ted

Bill: How is that ever going to save the world?

Ted: Good point...How about... A frog!...I could be Frog-boy! Leaping tall buildings in

a single "Rubbit!"...

Bill: Ted. Let's think about this sensibly. Peter Parker was bitten by a radioactive spider.

That bite turned him into Spiderman. Have you ever been bitten by anything Ted?

Ted: Yes! Excited. Yes I have! Bangers the Hamster! Last week I was cleaning out his cage and he bit me! Brilliant! I'm

Hamster boy! That can be my superhero identity!

I must say, I felt a bit funny at the time...

Starts making hamster face...

Bill: Hamster boy?!

Ted: Ted has already entered a fantasy world... arm outstretched, chest puffed,...

By day he's Ted Watson, but by night he's Hamster boy

ever alert to... ever alert to...Bill... what can hamsters be ever alert to?

Bill: Saw dust? Sunflower seeds

Ted: Hmm. Not great. What special powers do hamsters have?

Bill: Running inside a wheel?

Ted: What else?

Bill: They can fill their cheeks with enormous amounts of food?

Ted: That's it! That's brilliant Bill! I can do that! You know I can! I can put half a doughnut in each cheek easily! I

really am hamster boy!!! This is the best super-hero identity ever!

Bill: But, I'm not sure your power will help many people...In fact, I think it will only help you!

Let's get our assignment out.

Ted: Opens envelope and reads, "You task is to uncover who Jesus really is. Be careful, because so many people get

confused about who Jesus is. Most people never really find out"

Cor! This is a tricky one!

Bill: Why do you say that Ted?

Ted: Well... If most people don't know who Jesus- what chance do we have?

Ted: Reluctantly We were fitted out for our new all body lycra suits. We chose our colours, patterns and designs.

Excited I'm getting a flash across here. And on my legit's going to say, "Kazooom". With a big black "Whoosh" running from my neck over my head. Still a bit bored

Bill: Is that it?

Ted: Reluctantly. No, we've also decided what our normal, everyday jobs will be and how we'll disguise ourselves.

Unable to contain excitement. I'm going to be a zoo keeper. I get to look after the gorillas. Does gorilla impression.

Bill: Are the gorilla's going to be looking after you, or are you looking after the gorillas?

Ted: Proudly I am going to be the deputy chief assistant, to the acting, honourary, gorilla keeper

Bill: Interrupting and nodding to reassure Which sounds like a very...

Ted: Very proudly With special duties for the sanitisation and waste removal of all bodily by products.

Bill: Does that mean you're cleaning their muck out?

Ted: Not shaken I'm in charge of it. On my own. Without help. And I might even get to go to other zoos to teach other people how to do it.

What could there be that makes everyone look worried?

Oh look- its huge flood

Of water? Of treacle? Of goo? Would that be worrying?

Oh! God's anger on our sin.

That's why they're really worried. They all have the same big weakness- sin

And one day God will show his anger with the way we've all treated him

That's the flood that has arrived

I'd be terrified

It's deserved.

What we deserve,

When you get something wrong, you deserve punishment

God's not a monster! Parents punish. Only people who care punish us. That's right isn't it?

But there's something in the way. What is it?

Its Jesus cross.

Oh I get it. This helps us see how Jesus saves us

When Jesus was on the cross, he took all God's anger

He was punished in our place

We're protected because of Jesus.

Look, we're safe

That's you and me there. That's anyone who trusts Jesus and wants him to be their King

Phew!

Ted has his fingers in his ears

Ted: slowly, staying very still. If we're careful. And no sudden thoughts. I think my brain can do it. But speak slowly

Ted: Evil masterminds, planning to take over the world, meet me and think ...

Bill: ... Is he a boy or a hamster? Has he got a donut in each cheek? I'm not going to take over the world just yet, I'm going to find out if he's really half hamster, half boy.

Ted: Angry. No. No. No. You're not taking me seriously. Stamping foot. I am a really, really good superhero. I have learnt how to be good from the best.

Bill: Suddenly serious. From Jesus? Have you learnt from Jesus?

Ted: Yes.

Bill: So you're really keen for this whole "Jesus" thing.

Ted: No, I mean yes Jesus is, but I meant the bloke.

Heroes Academy Day 5/Sunday Bill and Ted

Bill: What's that on his back? It's a sack full. It looks so heavy. He can hardly carry it

Ted: It must be full of stuff

Bill: Probably.

Bill: And here is his question

Ted: "What must I do to get into Heaven?"

Good question

Bill: Its funny, how he asked it. "What must I do to get into Heaven?"

Cartoon 2 and Concluding the day

Sketch draws out 2nd Cartoon of the day, in this order... Jesus' feet, man walking away with sack and "I'm going to do this on my own" and finally the girl following Jesus saying, "You're the one that I trust"

Bill and Ted, Ad lib as using lines like...

Bill: Well that's Jesus

Ted: Brilliant

Bill: That's the man from the story.
Ted: Oh, he's going the wrong way.

Bill: That's sad; come back!

Bill: I'm not sure he can hear you!

Ted: What an idiot. Well he's still carrying all that stuff. He still thinks he can do it all himself. He thinks he can get himself to Heaven.

Ted: But he can't, can he?
Bill: No. Look, another one.

Ted: I don't remember another one.

Bill: It's a normal kid, like you and me.

Ted: I love these ones. They're great. So happy. So pleased.

Bill: She's following the King.Ted: No wonder she's so happy!

Bill: And walking is so much easier without a whopping sack of stuff.

Ted: And look, what's she saying? Bill: "You're the one that I trust!"

Ted: So she's not going to try to <u>do</u> it herself

I can fly. *Billie is surprised by this news, after each new claim, Billie shakes her head,* I can climb walls. I can leap tall buildings in a single bound. I can crush steel girders with this little finger. I am impregnable. *Strikes a pose*

Bill: Ted. Was all of that a lie?

Ted: Erm...Iam called Ted.Iam a bit brilliant. Pause

Bill: And the rest?

Ted: Frustrated. I'm Ted, I'm a small boy. And sometimes, I can rescue small animals from low hanging branches..., Bill nods as long as Billie is nearby in case I fall.

Ted: What an idiot.

Bill: Well he's still carrying all that stuff. He still thinks he can do it all himself. He thinks he can get himself to

Heaven.

Ted: But he can't can he?

Bill: No.

Bill: Look, another one.

Ted: I don't remember another one.

Bill: It's a normal kid, like you and me.

Ted: I love these ones. They're great.

Bill: She's so happy.
Ted: She looks terrific.

Bill: She's following the King
Ted: No wonder she's so happy!

Bill: And walking is so much easier without a whopping sack of stuff.

Ted: And look, what's she saying? Bill: "You're the one that I trust!"

Ted? Where are you? Ted?

Ted: In a grump. We hear his voice but can't see him. I'm not coming out

Bill looks around. He is frozen. Utterly confused.

Bill: Ted?

Ted: Pause. Yes?

Bill: Where are you?

Ted: I'm not telling.

Bill: Walks to one side of the stage to listen there. Ted?

Ted: Yes?

Bill: Walks to the other side of the stage, again to listen. Ted?

Ted: Yes?

Bill is baffled. He can't see Ted anywhere. He goes to the trunk and sits down on it.

As he sits down there is a muffled noise....

Bill: Oof.

Ted: Hearing it. Bill? Are you alright?

Pause. A bit worried. Bill?

Bill: A bit cross. Yes!

Ted: Are you alright? Where are you?

Bill: I'm not telling you. I'm fed up.

Ted: Looking up and around as he talks, wondering where Bill is? Why? What's happened?

Bill: Angry. Why? What's happened? Has your brain turned to squirty cream? What's happened? Jesus, who I

thought was the forever King has died. It turns out he wasn't very forever after all! He's gone. He's finished. He'd

done. Pause. And so am I. I'm gone. Finished. Done.

Silence.

Ted: Gets up and runs around searching for him. Bill? Are you there? Don't leave me.

Silence.

Come back!

Ted slumps down on the trunk and looks like she's about to cry.

Bill: Oof.

Wondering if he's in the trunk, Ted gets up and sits down again.

Oof.

And again.

Oof.

Ted: Would you stop that?

Bill: Looking at the trunk. You're not.

Ted: I am Bill: Why?

Ted: Because I'm fed up. I wanted to go somewhere dark and I wanted to be somewhere with a lot of donuts.

Bill: You're not?

Ted: I am.

Bill: Throwing open the lid. Oh no! You are a revolting, shocking, donut munching.... giant.... donut.

Ted: Emerging with a donut in his mouth.

Bill: How many have you eaten?

Pause. How many?

Ted: Sheepishly, with his mouth full of donut. 17.

Bill: 17? 17!

Ted: Ted holds up the remaining bit of donut in his hand. And a half.

Bill: 17 and a half donuts. I don't know what to say?

Ted: Good. That's probably best. There is nothing more to say. We have spent this week finding out all about Jesus. We've found out how he arrived, his greatest superpower, our weakness, who he really is and even that he rescued us by <u>dying</u>. But... well.... it turns out that he... died. It's bonkers. What sort of rescue is that? Super heroes don't died rescuing. That's not a rescue. It's a ...er...

Bill: Death?

Ted: Still cross. Yes. That's exactly what it is.

Ted: That's strange.

Bill: Reading. Just as Jesus said it would.

Ted: Grabs the piece of paper. What? This is nuts.

Sketch music starts.

Sketch draws first sketch of empty tomb.

Bill and Ted make wild guess and eventually work it out.

Cartoon 2 and Concluding the day

Sketch draws out 2nd Cartoon of the day, empty tomb with Jesus and our little friend walking off into the distance

Bill: Well, what a thing? I did not see that coming.

Ted: No nor did I.... What didn't we see coming?

Bill: Oh Ted! Right, sit down.

Ted sits in the "Hero or Villain" hot seat

Right, what is the biggest thing you have learnt today? Ted goes to leave, but Bill pushes him back into his chair.

Ted: Oh! I don't know. Um. I preferred it in my box. At least I wasn't asked difficult questions there.

Bill: Let me remind you of what you said earlier today.

Ted: I've eaten 17½ donuts? Oof? Your brain has turned to squirty cream?

Bill: You did say all of those things. But I'm less interested in those things.

Ted: Did I say anything else? I don't remember.

Bill: No. I don't suppose you do. You seem too often forget things you say that are nonsense! Can you remember why you were cross with Jesus?

Ted: Yes! He died rescuing us.

Bill: And is that right?

Ted: No... orYes? Which one? "He died rescuing us". He did. I got that right! You can call me brainy Brian McBrains

Bill: And you also said that Jesus can't be the forever King, because he's not....forever.
