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## With Zacchaeus

LUKE 19:1-10



#### **Big Idea:**

We are all lost sinners, but Jesus came to look for us and save us.



Children who are delighted that Jesus came looking to save sinners like us.



Pray and read the Bible passage. Read Where are we going? and Win my heart first to give you a better understanding of the passage and the Big Idea. Spend some time thinking through how this makes a difference to your life.

Read the lesson plan for the age group you will be teaching. Use a **Get Going** or **Brain Break** idea from a different age group if it is better suited to your children.

Prepare your lesson. Think through the Take 10 minutes to focus! questions before preparing your

Teaching Time. Use the International Children's Bible (which can be found online at www.biblegateway.com) for a simplified version of the text during Teaching Time. Keep the Big Idea in your mind to help you teach it clearly in every part of your lesson. Collect/draw/print/make what you need for the different sections of the lesson.

Pray for the children in your group to grasp the Big Idea and to live it out in their lives. Remember that you have the Holy Spirit's help as you teach God's word!



## Where are we going?

The children need to understand how lost Zacchaeus was. No one thought he could or should be in God's family – he was the scum of the earth. But Jesus deliberately went to this man's tree, called this

man's name, went to this man's house and changed this man's heart. Jesus came to seek and save the lost like Zacchaeus, like us and like the children we teach. What grace!

# Win my heart first

Have you ever been lost? In a dark and unfamiliar place, alone, confused and helpless? It's a terrifying feeling. Compare that with the feeling of being found – relief and thankfulness at being rescued and taken home to safety. That is our story as lost sinners who have been found by Jesus, rescued from the dark and taken home to safety with our Father. This story challenges us to see just how lost we were, and how incredible the comfort of being found and saved is.

v1 Luke has taken us on quite a journey. From the fishing towns of the North to the busy cities of the South, we have made it to Jericho. The story of Zacchaeus is really the story of God's great plan in a nutshell.

v2 Zacchaeus is the chief tax collector, or literally 'arch tax collector'. He was either the manager of other tax collectors or he was one of the very best at his job.

A tax collector was hated for two reasons in particular.

- He was a traitor: He was Jewish but worked for the occupying force - the Romans. He collected taxes from his own people to pay to Caesar.
- He was a thief: He could decide how much tax to take. He could take more than was required by Caesar and pocket the difference. He was 'wealthy' while his fellow Jews got poorer.

v7 We would have felt the same as the crowd. Imagine the Queen walked past us and asked a known murderer or brutal bully to tea – how would you respond? Zacchaeus was not a funny, endearing little man. He was a cheating criminal. The crowd despised him. They wanted Jesus to feel the same.

v8 'Lord'. At its heart, Christianity is accepting Jesus as the one in charge of our lives. We become a Christian when we trust him. And when we trust him, we choose to follow his way.

Zacchaeus said, 'I give half of my possessions to the poor.' Greed was replaced with generous love.

Zacchaeus said, 'If I have cheated anybody out of anything, I will pay back four times the amount.' Dishonesty was replaced with practical repentance.

v9 Because Zacchaeus was a Jew, he was already a kind of 'son of Abraham'. But that misses the shock here. To be a 'son of Abraham' is by faith, not by birth. Trusting in the promise of rescue means that he now belongs to Jesus Christ. (Galatians 3:26–29)

v10 This verse starts, 'For' because it is explaining how the shock of v9 is possible, Zacchaeus can be in God's family precisely because Jesus came for those who are hopelessly and frighteningly 'lost'. He came for Zacchaeus and people like him. Jesus came for me. Jesus came for you.



## Question for my heart

Think about the people you know who seem utterly unlovely. Have you written them off as people Jesus would never want? Why do you think you do that? What do you think of yourself? Are you someone who Jesus must want or a sinner forgiven by his grace?



This has been written as an all-age slot to introduce the whole church family to what the children are learning today, but it could be adapted for the children's classes.



Volunteers to play the parts of Jesus and Zaccheus and the crowd.



Perfume, money – notes and coins, piggy bank, step ladder with a picture of a tree attached to it, a sign with 'SINNER' on one side and 'LOST' on the other side, a large heart with 'SAVED' on it, binoculars (see Explorers Craft Time).



## What to Say



We're still in our series 'Meals with Jesus'. So far, we've heard about Jesus eating with some very unexpected people. He often chose to eat with sinners – the people who weren't living God's way. Some of them had messy lives like the woman with the perfume and others were low life bad guys like Levi the cheating tax collector. But Jesus came to save sinners – so they were the people he chose to eat with.

Hold up perfume. Hold up money.

In today's story, Jesus ate with another tax collector. Just like Levi, Zacchaeus was hated because he worked for the enemy and got rich that way too. He was a traitor and the last person anyone ever wanted to hang out with.

Zacchaeus sits at the front putting coins into a piggy bank, rubbing his hands together.

Zacchaeus heard that Jesus was coming to town. He wanted to see him just like everyone else did.

But, Zacchaeus was a short chap. Very short. So if he wanted to see Jesus then he needed to be at the front of the crowd.

That would have been easy for someone who was liked. But Zacchaeus was hated. He had no chance getting to the front.

Zacchaeus gets down from his chair and 'walks' on his knees (to appear short) to the front.
A group of people come to the front and stand in front of Zacchaeus.

But then he had a genius idea! The crowd wasn't going to stop him from seeing Jesus.	Zacchaeus climbs up the tree (step ladder).

### What to Say

## What to Do

Zacchaeus was lost. He wasn't lost up a tree. He was a sinner lost from God.

But Jesus went looking for him. He found him, saved him, changed his heart and welcomed him into God's family. Wow!

Zacchaeus turns the 'SINNER' sign around to show 'LOST'

Jesus looks through the binoculars until he looks at Zacchaeus. He takes the 'SINNER' sign away and gives him a heart with 'SAVED' written on it.

Jesus is still looking for lost sinners to save. He speaks to us through his word, the Bible. If you are still a lost sinner, he wants to find and save you. How will you respond?

Hold up a Bible. Hold up the 'SAVED' heart.

## Lesson Overview





















## 10 Minutes to Focus

When preparing, keep these questions in mind and check your planning to see that you are ready to engage your group. Take that clarity into your Teaching Time so that you get the Big Idea across.



## Get Going

Focus the children's attention on the theme of the session using a game or activity. Light, not manic, so that the children can be calm afterwards, with their minds ready.



# Teaching

Teach the key content of the lesson in an engaging way. Place emphasis to point clearly to the Big Idea. If you have used the Bible Story Idea already, you may not need to cover the whole story again. If not, you can adapt it to use here with your group or tell the story in another way, perhaps using the suggestions below. However you do this Teaching Time, conclude with a simple explanation of the Big Idea.



## **Brain Break**

A chance to rest the children's minds before Heart and Hands. Get children moving. Finish by linking the activity to the Big Idea so that this time serves the Bible story.



# Heart &

#### Small group discussion:

The vital chance for the children to reflect on the story, so that its truths impact their hearts. They do the talking, not the leader. All the children need to be given the opportunity to respond. Ask each question to multiple children. The questions will lead the children to see how their heads (thoughts), hearts (feelings) and hands (actions) are shaped by the Bible story through the work of the Spirit.





**Take 10 minutes to focus!** Being 'lost from God' is a difficult concept for young children to understand. Think about how you can explain it clearly and simply.



#### **Lost Zacchaeus**

#### You will need:

A toy figure to be Zacchaeus and a pot plant.

Show the children the toy figure before hiding it in the room for the children to find – repeat a few times. Each time you hide the figure, tell the children, 'Zacchaeus is lost – he needs to be found' so they hear the repetition of 'lost and found' before **Teaching Time**. Hide the figure in the plant the last time you hide it.

Link: Today's story is about Zacchaeus. He was lost from God's family.



#### You will need:

The Bible story illustrations (see Appendix) or an illustrated Children's Bible (e.g. The Beginner's Bible), toy figure used in **Get Going** and binoculars (from **Craft Time**).

Use the pictures (or Illustrated Bible) to tell the story of Zacchaeus. As you go through the story, explain that Zacchaeus was bad and mean. He was a sinner – he was lost from God.

Ask the children 2 simple questions as you go through the story to help them get the main point e.g. 'Who was lost from God?' (hold up the toy figure before hiding it out of sight every time you ask the

question) and 'Who looked for lost Zacchaeus?' (hold up the binoculars from **Craft Time** every time you ask the question).

Finish by explaining that Zacchaeus was lost from God (hide the toy figure). But Jesus looked for him and found him (hold up the binoculars and bring the toy figure into view). Jesus forgave Zacchaeus and made him friends with God. We are like Zacchaeus. We need Jesus to find us and forgive us too (hold up the binoculars).

End with the memory sentence – 'Jesus looks for sinners to save'. Get the children to repeat it back to you a few times.



#### **Lost and Found**

#### You will need:

Toy figures, binoculars (see Craft Time), picture of a crown and a blanket.

Hide the toy figures at one end of the room and put the crown picture on the other side. Have a leader pretend to be Jesus (use the binoculars). Ask the children to help 'Jesus' to find the lost people and bring them 'home' to his family (place them on the crown picture). After the toy figures have been found, let some children take turns being 'lost' (help them hide under a blanket) and then 'found' by 'Jesus'.

Link: Zacchaeus was lost from God. But Jesus found him and saved him.



#### **Craft Time - Make binoculars**

#### You will need:

A craft sheet (see Appendix) and 2 cardboard tubes/ toilet roll tubes per child, stickers, crayons, tape and string.

Let the children decorate the craft sheet. Tape 2 cardboard tubes together, wrap the craft sheet around it with the eyes on the top and attach string as a neck loop. Use this craft time to reinforce the **Big Idea** of the lesson to get them ready for **Think Time**.

#### **Think Time**

Use the illustrations to remind the children of the story. Point to different parts of the pictures and

ask them to tell you what is happening. Remind the children we are lost from God – like Zacchaeus. But Jesus looks for sinners and saves them (hold up binoculars).

#### **Big Question**

Who does Jesus look for? Sinners.

#### A follow up question

Why? To save them.

#### Pray

Dear Jesus, thank you for looking for sinners and saving them. Amen.







**Take 10 minutes to focus!** How will you help the children understand that being a sinner means we are 'lost from God'? Help them to see that they are helpless to save themselves. Highlight how incredible it is that Jesus looks for messy, bad sinners like Zacchaeus and us.



#### Lost People You will need:

A bag of jelly babies and a paper plate with a crown drawn on it.

Hide jelly babies around the room (have spares

so the children can have one after the game). Get the children to look for the 'lost people'. When they find one, they must take it to the plate so it is 'home with God'.

Link: Today's story is about a person who was 'lost from God'. We will find out who found him.



#### You will need:

Crown picture (from **Get Going**), props e.g. coins, pot plant/fake plant.

Read the story of Zacchaeus while the children act it out using the props. As you go through the story, highlight what Zacchaeus was really like and how hated he was by others. Get the children acting as the crowd to put on their most shocked expressions when Jesus says he wants to visit Zacchaeus' house. Ask them how they would have felt if they had been there. Get the children to show you how they would have responded if Zacchaeus gave back the money he had taken from them.

When you have been through the story, ask the children acting as Zacchaeus and Jesus to stand at the front. Choose another child to hold up the crown

drawing (from Get Going). Explain how Zacchaeus was 'lost from God' because he was a sinner. Turn 'Zacchaeus' so he is facing away from the crown. Ask him to walk around as if he is lost – avoid going near the crown. Explain that on his own, he can't get back to God. Ask the children who can help Zacchaeus. Explain that Jesus said he came to find lost people and save them. Ask 'Jesus' to find lost 'Zacchaeus' and take him to the crown where he is 'home with God'. Explain that Zacchaeus had been forgiven by Jesus – he was saved.

Finish with a point or two about how the Bible says we are all lost - like Zacchaeus - because we are all sinners. We all need to be found. Ask the children if they can get themselves 'home to God'. Ask them who is the only one who can find them. Keep in mind the Big Idea and what you thought through in Take 10 Minutes to Focus as you make your last points.



#### **Action Story**

Designate one side of the room as 'trees' and the other side as 'Zacchaeus' house'. Have the children stand in the centre of the room. Call out the phrases in any order – children must do the linked action. Either increase the speed until it is chaos or play until you have a winner – anyone who gets it wrong or is the last one to do the action, is out.

- Jesus is in town run to the 'trees' area.
- Zacchaeus' house run to the 'Zacchaeus' house' area.
- Complaining crowd wag a finger and say 'Tut, tut, tut.'

- Terrible Tax Collector rub hands together saying, 'Lovely money.'
- Jesus looks for sinners pretend to hold binoculars up to your eyes.
- Found Zacchaeus hands in the air and shout, 'I'm in his family!'

Link: A lot happens in today's story. But the most amazing thing was Jesus finding, saving and changing Zacchaeus.



Use the illustrations to help the children remember the story. Worksheet A is the suggested sheet for this age group. The questions below can mostly be found on the worksheet which has been designed to aid your discussion. If possible, enlarge the page to A3 so you can work on it together. Make sure each child can still answer the personal questions honestly for themselves (e.g. hand out Post-it notes for them to write/draw their answers to these questions).

#### Did you spot it?

- What was Zacchaeus like?
- Why did people hate him?

#### Work it out

- How was Zacchaeus 'lost'?
- Who found Zacchaeus? What does it mean that Jesus 'found' Zacchaeus?
- Why is it so surprising that Jesus looked for Zacchaeus?

#### Live it out

- How does it make you feel that Jesus looks for sinners like me and you? Why?
- Can you think of someone who is always getting into trouble? How would Jesus want to help them?
- What can you remember from today's story if you've had a bad day – e.g. been rude to an adult or mean to a friend – and you think Jesus wouldn't want anything to do with you?

#### **Prayer Idea**

- Ask the children if they can think of someone they want to ask Jesus to look for and save. Turn those into prayer requests.
- Thank Jesus for loving us enough to look for us and save us so we can be in God's family.

#### **Craft Time**

#### Make binoculars.

Have the craft ready to use if you have time available after your discussion. Craft instructions can be found in the Explorers Craft Time section.







Take 10 minutes to focus! How will you clearly explain v10 to help the children understand Zacchaeus' problem? This passage gives us the bad news that we are all lost. But the good news is that Jesus looks for and saves the lost! How will you help the children know the seriousness of being lost but also the joy of discovering that Jesus seeks us out?



#### **Seek and Save**

You will need:

A toy figure.

Choose a child to be the 'seeker' – they must stand outside the room while you hide the toy figure. The 'seeker' must then find the figure in a set amount of time. If they are struggling, get the rest of the children to indicate if they are getting closer or further away by calling out 'found' or 'lost'. Repeat a few times with a different child as the 'seeker'.

Link: Today's story is about a lost sinner – Zacchaeus. Jesus didn't need any help finding him!



#### You will need:

Bibles or the passage printed out, a pot plant, a bag of coins, binoculars (see Explorer's Craft Time), large cardboard photo frame for the scene 'selfies' (use an A0 size sheet of cardboard or make a frame from strips of cardboard).

Split the passage into 3 big scenes:

- 1. Zacchaeus in the tree (v1-6). Prop pot plant.
- 2. Zacchaeus at the house (v7-8). Prop bag of coins.
- 3. Jesus explains (v9-10). Prop binoculars.

If you have a small group, work through the scenes together, or split up to look at individual scenes.

Get the children to look at the detail of the story and

work out how to present it as a 'selfie' using their prop. Read out the scene verses before the children present their 'selfie' in the photo frame.

Once you've gone through the 3 scenes, talk about how verse 10 explains what was happening in the story. Can the children work out who was lost and how he was lost? Explain what it means to be lost from God. Do the children think anyone else in the story was lost? Why? Talk about what it means to be 'found' by Jesus. Help the children to see that Zacchaeus' change was a result of being forgiven and saved, not the other way around.

Finish with a point or two about how we are all lost and need to be found by Jesus. Keep in mind the **Big** Idea and what you thought through in Take 10 Minutes to Focus.



#### **Find Zacchaeus**

You will need:

36 paper plates. Write 'Zaccheaus' on one plate beforehand.

Place the plates face down in a 6x6 grid so that 'Zacchaeus' is 'lost' and needs to be 'found' by the children. Split into 2 teams. One at a time, a child from

each team picks a plate from the grid. Plain plates must be returned face down. If the 'Zacchaeus' plate is picked up, that team wins the round. Play a few rounds – redo the grid each time.

Make the game more active by having the children run from one side of the room to the grid before running

back to their team. If you have a small space, use small pieces of paper instead of plates and make a grid on a table

Link: In today's story, Zacchaeus was lost but Jesus found him and brought him into God's family.



Use the illustrations to help the children remember the story. Worksheet B is the suggested sheet for this age group. The questions below can mostly be found on the worksheet which has been designed to aid your discussion. If possible, enlarge the page to A3 so you can work on it together. Make sure each child can still answer the personal questions honestly for themselves (e.g. hand out Post-it notes for them to write/draw their answers to these questions).

#### Did you spot it?

- Ask each of the children to give one detail from the story.
- What kind of guy was Zacchaeus?
- Why did people hate him?

#### Work it out

- How was Zacchaeus lost?
- How would you have felt if you had seen Jesus choose Zacchaeus? Why?
- How did Zacchaeus change?

#### Live it out

- The Bible says we are all lost sinners. How does that make you feel? Why?
- How does it make you feel that Jesus looks for us

to save us?

 Think of someone you know near the 'awful' end of the scale. How would you feel if Jesus chose to find and save them?

#### Pray

- From this story, what do you want to thank God for?
- Who do you want to ask Jesus to look for and save?

#### **Craft Time**

Make a 'Jesus came to seek and save' pencil

Have the craft ready to use if you have time available after your discussion.

#### You will need:

A pencil and 2 self adhesive googly eyes per child. Colourful washi tape, wide clear tape and thin strips of paper.

Decorate the pencil with washi tape. Write 'Jesus came to seek and save' on a narrow strip of paper. Stick the paper to a piece of clear tape so the writing is still visible when the tape is stuck to the pencil. Stick 2 googly eyes to the pencil.



- Do you think you feel more like the crowd, shocked that Jesus was friends with Zaccheus or more like Zaccheus, over the moon that Jesus loved the terrible bloke?
- Jesus wanted the crowd to know that he came for the worst people. Jesus wanted Zaccheus to know that no one was too bad to be in his family. What do you think Jesus wants you to understand?



This component is suitable for a mixed group of children aged 3–11 years old. Use this if you are unable to break your group into smaller classes because of the number of children or leaders you have.



Take 10 minutes to focus! How will you help the children understand that being a sinner means we are 'lost from God'? Have a clear and simple explanation that your younger children will be able to grasp. Think about how you can help your older children understand the seriousness of being lost but also how incredible it is that Jesus seeks out sinners to save them.



#### Who Is Lost?

#### You will need:

A blanket and a toy figure (to be used as Zacchaeus in **Teaching Time**).

Get the children to close their eyes while you choose a child to be hidden under the blanket. Give the group

10 seconds to work out who is 'lost' under the blanket. Play a few times. For the final round, place the toy figure under the blanket. Reveal the 'Zacchaeus' toy to make the link to the story.

Link: Zacchaeus was lost. We will find out how he was lost and who found him in today's story.



#### You will need:

Toy figures, props (e.g. coins, a pot plant and a Lego/building block house), a large picture of a crown, binoculars (see Explorer's Craft Time).

Sit around a table and get the children to use the toy figures and the props to act out the story as you read it. Draw out the emotions in the story. Get the children to use facial expressions and body language to show you the crowd's anger and Zacchaeus' delight. Ask them how they would have felt if they had been there and seen Jesus choose Zacchaeus. Talk about the change in Zacchaeus – how would they have felt if he gave back the money he had taken from them?

After you have gone through the story, help the children understand how Zacchaeus was lost from God and not physically lost. Use the large crown to show that he was away from God and couldn't get himself

back. Ask the children who went looking for Zacchaeus (hold up the binoculars). Explain that Jesus said he looks for lost sinners to save them – that is why he chose Zacchaeus. Explain that being found by Jesus meant Zacchaeus had been saved – his sin was forgiven. Place the Jesus and Zacchaeus figures on the crown to show how Zacchaeus had been brought into God's family – he was welcomed in.

Finish with a point or two about how the Bible says we are all lost – like Zacchaeus – because we are all sinners. We need Jesus to find us and save us. Keep in mind the Big Idea and what you thought through in Take 10 Minutes to Focus as you make your last points.

Get the older children to teach the younger ones the memory sentence – 'Jesus looks for sinners to save'. Encourage them to make up some actions to help them remember it.



#### Safe With God

#### You will need:

A large crown picture and blankets.

Place the crown picture on one side of the room. Choose a child and have them wait outside the room while the rest of the children hide (use the blankets to hide children around the room if there are no good hiding spots). Bring the child back into the room to find the 'lost' children. When a child has been found, they must be taken to the crown picture where they are 'safe with God'.

Link: Lost sinners can't save themselves. Only Jesus can find us, save us and take us back to God.



If you have more than one leader then you could split up into smaller groups of similar aged children (if possible). If not then get the younger ones busy with a craft so you can have some discussion time with the older children.

Use the illustrations to help the children remember the story.


